"New Hope was then unaminously adopted as the name of the organization...", and its early years were led by Rev. L. W. Curtis. All friends of New Hope are invited to join their celebration on Sunday, October 23, 1977. Sunday School will be at 10:00 A.M. and worship service at 11:00, lunch at 12:30 P.M. and a song service at 1:30 P.M.

Rev. William Love is pastor and Rev. Mary Bettis Love is associate pastor of New Hope Presbyterian Church.

DID YOU KNOW...

Monthly Pay for Soldiers

Of the millions of men who enlisted in the Civil War armies, not too many would have mentioned the monthly pay as the primary motivation. The pay for infantry privates on both sides, \$11 per month at the start of the war, was very low even for those days. Black Union Privates, paid only \$10 a month, so resented this that some units refused to be paid at all until they were treated the same as white soldiers. Musicians made \$12 a month. A Corporal's pay was \$13, a sergeant's \$17, a 1st sergeant's \$20, and a sergeant major's \$21.

The pay for Union privates soon rose to \$13 a month, and in May 1864 it was raised to \$16. Confederate privates' pay was increased to \$18 in 1864, but by that time inflation had so destroyed the Confederate economy that a pair of shoes would have cost \$125. To make matters worse, it would be a year or more sometimes before a paymaster would show up in some

Confederate units.

Officers of course, were better rewarded for their service. A 2nd lieutenant in the rebel infantry would receive \$80 a month, a 1st lieutenant \$90, a captain \$130, a major \$150, a lieutenant colonel \$170, and a colonel \$195. A brigadier general received \$301 a month, a major general \$350, a lieutenant general \$450, and a general \$500. A general commanding an army got an additional \$100 each month, and generals serving in the field received another \$50.

Engineer, artillery, and cavalry soldiers were paid at higher rates than infantrymen. The greatest difference affected sergeants in the engineer corps: all grades received \$34 a month,

compared with \$21 for an infantry sergeant major.

"It is wonderful how having money in the pocket improves the appearance of a soldier. He stands straighter, walks prouder, looks happier, acts more independent and enjoys better health." reported a soldier after payday.

SHALLOTTE

A traveler crossed the "Shallotte" River in 1734. He called this river the Charlotte, Little Charlotte and Little Carlotta. Later on this eventually turned out to be Shallotte (which as Susie pointed out happened quite frequently depending who was writing the name at the time). As a matter of fact Bishop Asbury noted that the correct name was Charlotte but vulgarly or improperly it was called Shallotte.

In 1837 the name Shallotte was firmly fixed when the post office was established.

In 1860 in Shallotte there were many individual operators of the tar and pitch business in this area. This was mostly done by slaves. One traveler remarked that when he approached these pine forests he heard the slaves yodel as they worked.

Of course Shallotte was settled mainly due to navigable river since there were no roads for traveling.

In 1855 a plank road from Waccamaw to Shallotte was envisioned but this was never

In 1894 the railroad came and connected all these area.

In 1895 it was proposed that a railroad run through Smithville, Lockwood Folly and Shallotte. Voters of Shallotte approved a \$14,000 bond. However, the railroad company failed to keep its performance agreement and nothing ever became of the venture.

In 1889 Shallotte was established at its present location. This is where the main public road bridge crossed over the river. Shallotte was not a planned community. The inhabitants inhabited tracts of 1 to 2 acres. Because of its location, it evolved as a center of trade. Products from the surrounding areas were brought here for shipment to Wilmington.

- 1899 Shallotte incorporated with a population of 149.
- 1915 It became a regular town with a post office, 5 general stores, a drug store, a hotel, one doctor, 2 turpentine factories and 2 churches (Baptist and methodist).
- 1921 A bond issue for roads with one major artery became a reality with the road extending through Southport, Lockwood Folly and Shallotte.

In 1922 the Health Dept. established a branch in Shallotte. From then on it grew to and in 1929 several major industries came to this area as well as tourism.

As they say the rest is history.

BOLIVIA, A TOWN CREATED TO BE THE HUB OF BRUNSWICK COUNTY

Brunswick county expanded in the late 1800's and early 1900's in conjunction with development of railroads, telephone, telegraph and roadways.

Several new communities evolved, but among them Shallotte and Bolivia were chartered. Bolivia was named after the country in 1911, a date which corresponded with opening of the Navasa to Southport railroad.

The railroad carried passengers but was primarily freight including products from the forest and fishing industries.

Bolivia in the heart of the timber region was a major stop along the railroad. Although Shallotte was the major developing town between 1900 and 1920, Bolivia was not far behind and had ambitious plans to grow. This was fueled by its location along the RR and on the major north/south road, the Georgetown Rd.

By 1915 the town proper had 2 sawmills, 6 general stores, a livery stable and 2 churches. Six additional sawmills were located nearby along the railroad, and the Bolivia Warehouse Company had been established for handling regional tobacco. The hope was, for Bolivia to become the principal tobacco warehouse and auction center for the Southeast. This goal was focal to the fate of the community for investors had plans to make Bolivia the County Seat. These ambitions were put on hold during the war.

After the war, local political struggles began.

* March 1919 - General Assembly directed Brunswick to schedule an election for April 1920 to determine whether county government should move to either Supply or Bolivia (or remain in Southport)

* Vote was Bolivia (624) vs Supply (562) vs Southport (406). A run-off was held between Supply and Bolivia and the latter won by a vote of 754 to 370. Funds were designated to establish

county court and jail in Bolivia

* Southport objected saying the vote did not reflect a majority of the eligible voters (2127 were eligible to vote but

only 1124 actually did so).

* The legal challenge went to the superior court which ruled in Southport's favor. A permanent injunction was issued against moving the county offices. On appeal, the NC Supreme Court upheld the Superior Court ruling (March 1921).

The injunction prohibiting relocation of the County Seat was devastating to Bolivia. Shortly afterward the Warehouse closed and over the ensuing 50 years Bolivia's population decreased approximately 7%. Much of the other industry also withered and with close of rail service, the town stagnated.

During this period Shallotte's population increased approximately

3.5 fold and Southport enlarged by 35%.

Bolivia, however was not out of the game, and in 1975 a bill was introduced into the General Assembly:

"An act to allow the people of Brunswick County to decide by referendum whether the county seat, the courthouse and all other buildings and agencies of Brunswick County should be relocated to the general vicinity of Bolivia and Supply , and to establish guidelines for relocation"

The main focus was along highway 17 which had become the major transportation artery in the region.

The referendum vote took place on July 19, 1975 with 60% of those eligible actually voting. The vote was 5814 for Bolivia vs 2989 for Southport.

Bolivia's subsequent growth reflects the impact of relocating the government.

Some consideration was given to establish a splinter county (County of Clarendon) with Southport as the center, but this did not materialize.


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For Civil War buffs: The 14th volume of North Carolina Troops, 1861-1865: A Roster, has just been released by the N.C. Division of Archives and History. Of particular interest will be the section on the 61st N.C. Infantry, a regiment raised in New Hanover County, which saw service in the battles around Charleston, S.C., Petersburg, Va., and at the Battle of the Crater.

Like previous volumes, No. 14 lists soldiers' residence and age at time of enlistment, prewar occupation and, where appropriate, date, place and cause of death - a gold mine for genealogists. Among families represented are Moore, Mott, Reeves and Rivenbark.

Higginson Book Co., a reprint publisher from Salem, Mass., has just republished A History of New Hanover County and the Lower Cape Fear Region (1909) by Alfred Moore Waddell.

Waddell, a former congressman who was installed as mayor of Wilmington after the riots of 1898, originally intended the book as a two-volume work. However, a second volume, which would have carried the history from 1800 to the Civil Walt, was never published.

Even so, his book remains a valued reference on New Hanover and Brunswick counties from the Cofo nial and early federal eras. Modern historians lean heavily on Waddell's work in locating now-vanished plantations along the Cape Fear River?

Also included are data on Scottish immigration, St. Philip's Church at Brunswick Town, the Stamp Act crisis and the Battle of Moores Creek Bridge. James Sprunt relied on Waddell's research for much of his Chronicles of the Cape Fear.
